## THIS WEEKS REFLECTION FROM FR JONATHON

Today, Jesus presents what might be called his "mission statement". "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me... to bring glad tidings to the poor... to proclaim liberty to captives... recovery of sight... to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord." Jesus is the fulfilment of the prophecy of Isaiah 61; the long awaited Messiah that God the Father had promised to his people throughout the days of the Old Testament. It is through Jesus that the spiritually blind will be enlightened, that those who are slaves of sin will be free. The spiritually poor - those who admit their need of the help of God and who are open to his plan in their lives - will finally have a living hope in Christ. But the way of life that has been made known to us through Jesus Christ, the Kingdom of God, requires our humility and our obedience.

Too often Catholics are portrayed as people forced to live under oppressive rules. That is not true! If a code of morality is supposedly somber and oppressive, why are the happiest people in the world those whose lives revolve around a strict following of the Lord? People who chose the way of the Lord know true happiness - the biggest lie is that this can be found outside of the Lord. What many pass off as happiness are merely temporary plasters over broken lives. In bringing others to Jesus, we must be conscious of reflecting that the Law of God is liberating, not restrictive - that real happiness comes from God, and leads us back to God.

"The law of the Lord is perfect, refreshing the soul. The statutes of the Lord are trustworthy, making wise the simple. The precepts of the Lord are right, giving joy to the heart. The commands of the Lord are radiant, giving light to the eyes." (Ps. 19:7-8)

#### **WE KEEP IN OUR PRAYERS**

We keep in our prayers all those we know who are unwell, especially those who are named on our parish sick list, as well as the many who have no one to pray for them and for those in hospital. Owusu's Requiem Mass will take place on Tuesday 28th January at 12noon followed by burial at Old Jesmond Cemetery. Esme's Funeral service will take place at Whitley Bay Crematorium on Thursday 30th at 9.30am. We also remember all those whose anniversaries occur at this time.

#### **WORD OF GOD SUNDAY**

This Sunday we celebrate the 6th Sunday of the Word of God. It is a profoundly pastoral initiative with which Pope Francis wants to make it clear how important it is in the daily life of the Church and our communities to refer to the Word of God, a Word that is not confined to a book, but which remains ever alive and becomes a concrete and tangible sign. The motto chosen by the Holy Father for the 2025 edition, within the Jubilee Year, is a verse from Psalm 119, "I hope in your Word". It is a cry of hope: man, in a moment of anguish, tribulation, and confusion, cries out to God and puts all his hope in him.

#### MASS NEXT WEEKEND

Next weekend we celebrate the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple. At the beginning of Mass, as is customary, we will have the blessing of candles for the coming year. If you would like to bring in any candles to be blessed please feel free to do so.

### **ANNUAL WHITE FLOWER APPEAL - SPUC**

The Annual White Flower Appeal will take place this weekend. The Society for the Protection of Unborn Children exists to radically transform culture so that abortion is not only abolished but becomes truly unthinkable. SPUC is involved in politics, education, legislation and culture and seeks to restore a respect for the sanctity of human life in our society. A Marriage Preparation course must also be attended so that you are fully prepared for the Sacrament.

The next baptism preparation meeting will take place on Monday 4th February at 7.15pm at St Teresa's. To get your child Baptised, one parent must be a Catholic and you should be living in the parish. If you do not live within our parish you will be asked to speak to your own parish priest for his permission.

"In the course of the year," Pope Francis had written, "every effort should be made to enable the People of God to participate fully in its proclamation of hope in God's grace and in the signs that attest to their efficacy." 
### **LOUD**fence



#### **DIOCESAN PILGRIMAGE TO LOURDES**





## LEARNING MORE ABOUT THE FAITH **BUILDING THE KINGDOM OF GOD**

Most Catholics pray "thy kingdom come" hundreds of times in a year. But what are we asking for when we pray, and how will we know when our prayer is answered? Are we praying for a kingdom that is here or one that is coming?

The scriptures present the reign of God as both present and in the future. When the Pharisees ask Jesus about the coming of the kingdom, he says, "No one will announce, Look here it is," or 'There it is.' For behold, the kingdom of God is among you" (Luke 17:21). At the core of the message of the reign of God - in the Old and New Testaments - is the reality of God's sovereignty over creation.


Jesus preached about the kingdom through word and deed. In Jesus' actions we see that when God reigns, the poor have care, and people are freed from demons and healed. Through the parables, Jesus taught that the kingdom grows like a mustard seed, is a priceless treasure, and calls for dying to self, forgiveness, and sacrifice.

The Our Father confronts Christians in two ways. It presents the kingdom as having dual timing and also dependent on Christ's followers for growth. In word and deed, we are signs of God's kingdom. We forgive and reconcile, even when it is uncomfortable. We heal by taking time and effort to be present to those who are ill physically, emotionally, or spiritually. We respect, care, and advocate for the poor. When we pray "thy kingdom come," we are praying for the future triumphant reign of God, and we are also asking to be forgiving, healing people. We pray to be changed in those areas where God does not reign in our lives.

So in what ways are we bringing forth the Kingdom of God in our families, and in our daily life? I can I do more to build up the Kingdom of God in this parish?

## 'ONE BODY' WORD-FIND





SAINT PAUL tells us that we have been BAPTIZED into the ONE body of CHRIST which is the CHURCH. There are MANY MEMBERS, but they all work TOGETHER and CARE for each other. But the parts of a BODY are not ALL the same as each other! An EYE is different from an ear, and a HAND is not the same as a FOOT. If all your body was an EAR, then how could you SMELL?
