THIS WEEKS REFLECTION FROM FR JONATHON

Today's Gospel presents the first of Jesus' miracles - the changing of water into wine at Cana. The divinity of Jesus is manifest in this sign, his glory is revealed, "and his disciples began to believe in him."

In our second reading, Paul reminds us that God has generously lavished "in everyone" gifts of "different workings". These gifts are not our personal property to be used only for personal reasons - they are given to us for the purpose of our participation in Christ's mission, and are ways that God can work through us to answer prayers and create miracles where they are needed. There are many things in life that are beyond human control - miracles can only happen when God intervenes and makes them possible. Jesus asked the servants at Cana to do something well within their power - "Fill the jars with water" - and then leave the rest to him. Like them, we too can be instruments through which miracles are performed if we trust in him, and obey him.

In a sense, this reading can be seen as having two distinct and significant parts: one before Christ, and another after Christ. The opening scene is one of emptiness; and the second is marked by abundance - and what brings about the difference between the two parts is the intervention of Jesus. The six stone jars are filled to the brim - jars so big they would hold plenty if filled anywhere near the top. But Jesus filled them to the brim, with the very best wine! The empty jars represent all the empty places in our lives, and our longing to be filled with something more - in this miracle, Jesus is promising us that if we trust in him, he will fill us to the brim with the joy and peace that only God can give. This is always God's way - to give us much more than we ask for, and so much more than we deserve.

LEARNING MORE ABOUT THE FAITH WHAT IS ORDINARY TIME??


Last Monday we began the Season of Ordinary Time, however Ordinary Time is anything but Ordinary. When we hear the word ordinary we tend to think 'common' everyday or mundane. In other words, if something is ordinary it isn't very special. Ordinary from its Latin root means 'order'. When we order something, we arrange it in a sequence. That is, it is numbered. It is ordinal. We know why it is called ordinary time, but how is it differentiated from other liturgical seasons and feasts?

The Liturgical year is the calendar the Church uses for seasons, feasts and solemnities. Various calendars are used for various reasons, civil, school year, lunar ect. The liturgical year basically celebrates one thing: The Paschal Mystery. The Paschal Mystery is Jesus Christ's birth, life, Passion, death, Resurrection, Ascension and subsequent sending of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit, promised by Jesus to the apostles, is the One who brings us into relationship - into communion—with Christ's death and Resurrection. This death and Resurrection is the saving event that frees us from sin and death. The Father's raising of Jesus from the dead transcends all time, because the Spirit - whom Jesus said the Father would send - invites us into the saving Paschal Mystery.

That means, we are always invited by our God to enter into the depths of the Paschal Mystery. What does the Paschal Mystery have to do with ordinary time though?

The Paschal Mystery is so big, so deep, so vast, that we journey through this mystery for a whole year: the liturgical year. Sundays in Ordinary time "are devoted to the mystery of Christ in all its aspects" GIRM 43. Other liturgical seasons focus upon one aspect. For instance, during Lent we focus on turning away from sin in order for God to transform us into more faithful disciples. Feasts for saints celebrate the exemplary life of a saint who witnessed to Christ's Paschal Mystery in his or her very life, sometimes unto death. The weeks of Ordinary time then celebrate the whole Paschal Mystery on each Sunday and is segmented into two parts.

Ordinary Time is anything but Ordinary. Rather, we count the Sundays and the weeks as we celebrate the mystery of Jesus Christ who calls us into communion with himself as he leads us through the power of the Holy Spirit to the Father.
